Course Description

Aim

Participants:

- are familiar with theories and frameworks which are used for researching and analysing institutions and organisations.
- are able to discuss theoretical concepts and implications of frameworks.
- are able to use these theories and frameworks in order to design research.
- are familiar with selected methodological approaches to researching institutions and organisations
- reflect on and discuss their own work and that of colleagues in the light of the contents of the course and overall doctoral research.

Contents

- Situate research and analysis of institutions and organisations in wider social research and social science disciplines (structure agency debate, quantitative and qualitative research paradigms, micro and macro visions, different institutionalisms)
- Insights into a selection of theories (property rights theory, transactions cost theory) and frameworks (IAD, IoS, Integrative and Segregative Institutions (ISI)), which conceptualise institutions and organisations and the way they relate to the specificities of interactions between humans and their physical environment
- Insights into methodology and data gathering methods for researching and analysing institutions and organisations (quantitative, qualitative, case study research, analytic narratives, network analysis)
- Development of design for research of institutions and organisations in a specific case
- Apply the above knowledge in groups and in an exemplary fashion to a practical case
- Exchange of experiences about the process of working on and writing a doctoral, social science thesis
- Exchange about and discussion of research projects of participants

Course outline

Monday: Introduction and overview - a) theory of science perspective on the course

content, b) situating analysis of institutions and organisations in broader context of social theories (e.g. structure – agency, micro-macro debate)

Tuesday: Frameworks (IAD, IoS, ISI) and theories (Transaction cost theory and property

rights theory) and the specificities of applying them to interactions between

humans and the physical environment

Wednesday: *Methods* – empirical methods of data gathering, network analysis, quantitative

methods, analytical narratives

Thursday: Examples of doctoral research looking at institutions and organisations, group

work - research design for case study.

Friday: Case study visit (in or close to Berlin), evaluation of the case study, evaluation

and conclusion of the overall module

<u>Daily</u>: Seminars in which participants have the opportunity (if desired) to present their

own work.

If papers are submitted at least two weeks ahead of the course (20. August

2006) comments will be prepared by at least one of the lecturers as

"discussant". This may enhance the discussion of the work and its value for the student. Paper contributions are obligatory in order to obtain credits for the

course.

Teaching Methods

Lectures: 50%, seminars 30%, group work 10%, excursion 10%

• To obtain credits: short paper (ca. 2000 words, focus to be agreed bilaterally) (due 4 weeks after the course - 70%), oral paper presentation throughout the course (30%), alternatively to presentation contribution to design of case study visit (30%)
